## Single Tooth Dental Implant Procedure

- The process begins with your doctor determining the best size and placement of the dental implant.
- Next, the dental implant is placed in the site of the missing tooth. The implant will then be given time to heal and integrate into the bone. A temporary restoration may placed on top for the patient's comfort.
- Lastly, the final crown is permanently secured to the implant by your dentist.
- The new tooth will look natural and be just as strong as the real thing! The same thorough oral hygiene is required of this tooth as your natural teeth, including regular visits to your dentist.
